## Pay Your Way: Tools to Manage **Your Account and Save Money**

As I sat down to write this month's message, I couldn't help but think about my own electric bill this summer. If your AC is working overtime like mine, you're probably feeling the pinch, too. And with winter on the way, many of us are bracing for higher energy use in the colder months.

That's why I want to remind you about some helpful billing options available.

- ▶ BUDGET BILLING. Instead of paying more in the summer and winter and less in spring and fall, our levelized plan smooths out seasonal spikes. Your monthly bills stay consistent — like setting your energy costs on cruise control. The budget amount recalculates twice a year to reflect your usage accurately.
- ▶ PREPAY BILLING. If you've ever wished you could pay-as-you-go for electricity like you do fuel add funds, use what you need, get notified when it's time to refuel —

then Prepay Billing may be a good fit. No deposit is required and no connect/ disconnect fees assessed. If you have a deposit on file when you switch to Prepay, it will be credited to your account. You're notified when your account funds are running low, helping you stay in control of your usage and budget.

Highlights included electric safety demonstrations by cooperative linemen, a live raptor presentation from HawkQuest and a tour of the Craig Power Station.

notifications, view bills online, make payments or set up auto-pay. You can still receive a paper bill if you'd like, but SmartHub gives you account management options.

- ► ENERGY ASSISTANCE. Funds have not been approved for the 2026 Low-Income Energy Assistance Program (LIEAP), which has been a valuable resource for our members. We will provide details as soon as they are available. If you think you may qualify, be sure to apply early.
- ► APPLIANCE REBATES. If you're considering a new electric water heater or

heat pump system, we offer rebates to help offset the cost. Upgrading to more efficient equipment can lower future bills, and a rebate makes that purchase a little easier.

## **5 Farm Safety Tips for Kids**

Growing up on a farm helps children develop problem-solving skills, build close family bonds, and cultivate a deep passion for the land. However, agriculture is also one of the most dangerous industries for youth in the U.S. More young people die working in agriculture than in all other industries combined, with a child lost to an agriculture-related incident approximately every three days.

**KEEP KIDS OFF TRACTORS. Trac**tors are involved in more than 40% of fatal farm accidents involving children under 15. Most kids are not tall or strong enough to operate them safely. Only let youth operate one if they meet safety guidelines for age, size and maturity.

**SUPERVISE AND RESTRICT ACCESS.** Young children should never be in work areas unsupervised. Fence off or lock hazardous areas like grain bins, animal pens and equipment storage.

ASSIGN AGE-APPROPRIATE TASKS. Match chores to the child's abilities and maturity. Teens are more likely to take risks, so clear guidelines and supervision are essential.

**CREATE A SAFE ENVIRONMENT.** Remove hazards such as slippery or uneven surfaces, keep equipment keys out of reach and avoid repetitive motion. Provide protective gear like gloves, non-slip shoes and hearing protection.

TRAIN AND MODEL SAFE BEHAV-IOR. Teach kids how to perform tasks safely, practice together until they become proficient, and consistently demonstrate safe habits yourself.

Most kids simply aren't big or strong enough to handle them safely. Make sure any youth operating equipment meets age, size and maturity guidelines.

**Understanding the Power Behind Your Power** 



When you flip a switch, electricity flows instantly — but the journey to your home is a bit more complex. As a distribution cooperative, 4 Rivers isn't in the business to generate electricity. We purchase wholesale power as a member of Kansas Electric Power Cooperative, Inc. (KEPCo), our generation and transmission provider. KEPCo serves 17 rural electric co-ops in Kansas and secures power through a carefully managed mix of owned generation resources and wholesale market purchases.

This diversified mix helps keep costs stable and ensures reliable power even during unexpected events — like extreme weather or sudden changes in energy demand.

#### WHAT'S IN THE MIX?

Our power portfolio includes several types of generation:

- ▶ NUCLEAR ENERGY KEPCo owns 6% of Wolf Creek Nuclear Generating Station in Coffey County. This year, Wolf Creek celebrates 40 years of providing Kansans safe, reliable, carbon-free baseload electricity around the clock.
- ► COAL AND NATURAL GAS These traditional energy sources are still essential for consistent, large-scale generation. Coal plants run continuously to supply baseload power, while natural gas plants offer flexible backup during high-demand periods.
- ▶ WIND, SOLAR AND HYDROPOWER KEPCo's renewable energy mix includes long-term power purchase agreements for wind and solar generation, along with hydropower, one of the oldest and most consistent forms of clean energy. These resources help reduce emissions and support a Coal 17.5% sustainable energy future.
- ► MARKET PURCHASES KEPCo participates in the Southwest Power Pool Integrated Marketplace, where it can buy and sell electricity in real time. This flexibility helps balance load and take advantage of lower-cost energy when it's available.

► IN ADDITION TO KEPCO'S SUPPLY — 4 Rivers has two 1-megawatt utility-scale solar facilities, which feed directly into our distribution system, helping offset local demand during sunny periods. We also maintain backup diesel generators for summer peak demand support — just one more way we're investing in system reliability and affordability for our members.

#### WHY IT MATTERS TO YOU

As a 4 Rivers member-owner, you benefit directly from a balanced energy strategy. A diversified energy mix helps reduce exposure to fuel price spikes, supply shortages or single-source disruptions. It also allows KEPCo and 4 Rivers to adapt to new technologies and shifting regulations without compromising service.

At 4 Rivers, we know our members value dependable, affordable electricity. That's why our cooperative works closely with KEPCo to support a power supply that balances reliability, cost and long-term sustainability. Our board of trustees — elected by you, the members — helps guide these decisions to reflect the needs and values of the communities we serve.
